

Project REACH

(Reproductive Education to Achieve Community Health)

Project REACH was a three-year school and community partnership focused on quality sexual health education, teen health services, and youth leadership opportunities for middle and high school students in Oklahoma County. It was funded by the HHS/Office of Population Affairs (OPA) as part of an adolescent health initiative and included zip codes 73107, 73108, 73109, 73110, 73115, 73119, and 73129.

Teen emPower! (TEI) and Variety Care
Teen Clinic (VCTC) provided evidencebased programs (EBPs) and other health
promotion activities in seven middle schools
and four high schools in the Oklahoma City, Mid-Del, and
Crooked Oak districts. The project was coordinated by the
Oklahoma City-County Health Department (OCCHD), with
the program evaluation conducted by the Hudson College
of Public Health (HCOPH), University of Oklahoma.

This Yearbook offers a snapshot of program highlights for the 2022-23 school year. Our thanks to OPA, our school and community partners, teachers, parents, and youth participants for making this project a big success.

Teen emPower! has served more than 22,000 students since 2004, helping to empower, educate, and motivate them to make informed decisions for their sexual health. Each year, its SHAPE peer education program trains 30+ high school teens to present lessons to middle school students on managing peer pressure, understanding media messages, and learning assertiveness skills.


